OUTSTANDING WORK IN DIABETIC WOUNDS went to Nenette Brown MSN, FNP, WCC

- Initiated a wound care program for patients at San Diego Sheriff Department Medical Service Division
- Presented this wound care program at the American Correctional Health Service Association conference last September
- Encounters many diabetic wound patients who have learned the proper way to care for their wounds through her treatment and teaching, resulting in many wounds being healed for the first time
- Designed and taught an eight hour "hands on" course for 16 RNs and LVNs

OUTSTANDING RESEARCH IN WOUND CARE went to Connie Johnson RN, BSN, WCC

- Gets the entire staff excited about wound care
- Uses a collaborative team approach and evidence based research
- Developed a new agency formulary and protocol
- Helped create a program to improve dialogue with physicians, SBAR (situation, background, assessment, and recommendation)
- Appointed to the Wound Care Work Group for the Home Care Association of NJ
